Airport to begin taxiway revitalization

Project to begin during the summer and estimated to be complete before winter

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MT. VERNON — Due to new guidelines from the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration), the Mt. Vernon Outland Airport will soon begin a revitalization proj-

ect for Taxiway B2.

"The FAA now has changed guidance for what in their minds is safe and what is unsafe," Airport Director Chris Collins explained to the airport Board of Commissioners on Tuesday. "They no longer like taxiways that lead right to a runway, and we have a good one right here. [Our two taxiways] are what are called air carrier taxiways. They are extra wide and extra heavy to accommodate big airplanes that weigh a lot.

"Their new guidance says that they don't like some pilots that taxi right on out ... and then there's a runway accident, so we have to take these out. They won't do anything with them until they deteriorate enough to where they need to be taken

out."

Collins said he has called two different companies to hire for the contract work of rejuvenating the taxiway and recommended the use of Gee Asphalt Systems of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Gee Asphalt is approved by IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation)-FAA.

Collins continued to state, "The bottom line is that when this taxiway gets to where it's starting to rattle and crack, at that point [the FAA] will say 'Okay, Mt. Vernon, you can't have that anymore. We're tearing all

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that out, and we'll put another one in, maybe a little one right here so the pilot has to turn and then make another turn and make another turn and go out.' So if we want to preserve this, if we want it to last, we need to preserve it right now because it's only about three years old. That's when it was revitalized the last time."

The project would cost \$7,900 from the airport's Capi-

tal Projects Fund.

"The bad news is," said Collins, "we can't get federal or state funding for it. They won't pay for it because the FAA will not approve us doing this because to them it doesn't meet their new guidance. I can't stress enough how important a pavement this is to us. We use this during airlifts ... It has an extra radius for bigger airplanes to make their turns and everything"

The project is projected to begin work in the summer, with Collins estimating that the revitilization would be complete before winter. "I just didn't want to go into another winter without having the project [done]," Collins stated.

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
