Santorum makes stop in King City

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MT. VERNON — Republican presidential nominee Rick Santorum made a stop in the King City on Saturday, part of a tour of the state before Tuesday's General Primary Election.

"I'm encouraged by your enthusiasm," Santorum told ered in the community hangar at the Mt. Vernon Outland Airport. "Everyone says Illinois doesn't have conservatives. We're going to show them on Tuesday that the conservative move-

ment in Illinois is alive and well." Santorum compared himself to a Republican president from Illinois — Ronald Reagan.

"I'm running against the establishment like Ronald Reagan did," Santorum said. "They said the country needed a moderate, that Ronald Reagan was too conservative and he doesn't connect with people. ...

Santorum concentrated the majority of his message Saturday on the presidential race, talking about the need for a different president and how he was the candidate to beat President Barack Obama. He said the main issues are Obamacare, the economy and policy in the Middle East. He even joked about Obama being from Illinois.

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Council to discuss tax increase

MT. VERNON — The city council will be discussing a one-half percent increase to its Municipal and Service Occupation Tax — commonly referred to as Home Rule sales tax — during its meeting tonight.

The council announced its intention to raise the tax during a workshop session last week, stating the increase would be used to pay the debt on capital projects and to undertake additional projects, according to Mayor Mary Jane Cheslev.

Capital projects are currently financed through the food and beverage tax, the 2 cent per gallon diesel tax and the telecommunications tax.

"Unfortunately the revenues from those three sources are not enough to cover what we need to be doing," Chesley said last week. "The city is proposing a half-cent increase to sales tax to provide the revenue that we'd be needing to carry on these projects that we so desperately need to complete, particularly in economic development and quality of life."
